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## History Comes Alive at Knight

The Knight High School History Department is proud to announce the launch of History Comes Alive at Knight. This year-long celebration of history knowledge will kick off in history classrooms with an introduction to this year's theme: Rights and Responsibilities in History.

As students examine history through this lens, they will keep a list of topics related to the theme which interest them and research them. They will then create projects based on one of those topics which showcase their knowledge and understanding. These projects will be entered into the History Comes Alive at

Knight competition at the end of the school year. Winners of this competition will be eligible to win college scholarships, which will be donated by the History Through Film Club.

Various other events which celebrate history will take place throughout the school year. These events include monthly movie screenings hosted by the History Through Film Club, scavenger hunts, a 1920's-themed winter jubilee in December, and possibly field trips.

Department Chair of the History Department, sole instructor of the World History AP (WHAP) course, and Instructional Coach are only some of the hats which Mr. Stephan wears at Knight High School. Despite the many and varied responsibilities he fulfills on campus, Mr. Stephan's main priority has always been teaching his WHAP students and preparing them for the AP exam. With one of the highest WHAP exam passing rates in the district, Mr. Stephan's dedication to his

students' success is made evident. WHAP is a two-semester course made up of college-level curriculum which surveys world history from 8,000 B.C. to the present. It examines the history of Africa, the Americas, Asia, Oceania, and Europe from the foundations of human civilization to the modern era.

This year's WHAP exam will take place on May 14, 2015.

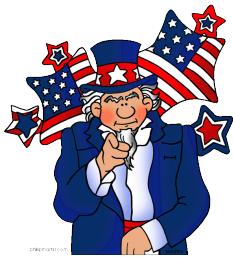
The first in-class unit exam will take place on September 19, 2014

As a Social Science teacher, Mr. Robinson believes it is important to go beyond historical concepts and convey the significance of citizenship and the necessity of global awareness. Education is a pathway for students to learn, grow and develop into active members of society.

This semester Civics students will pursue a deeper understanding of the institutions of American government. They will

compare systems of government in the world today and analyze the history and changing interpretations of the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the current state of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government.

The first in-class unit exam for Civics students will take place on September 5, 2014.

World History students in Mr. Robinson's class will study

major turning points that shaped the modern world from the late 18th century through the present. They will trace the rise of democratic ideas and develop an understanding of the historical roots of current world issues.

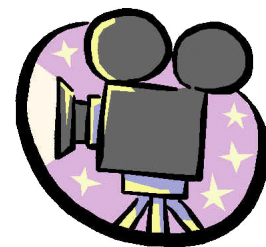
## History Through Film Club
